SEEDS OF A SOWER

As the new year began I was struck by the number of people I heard who were seeking balance in their lives. Finding balance is a common longing in our fast-paced, hurried, busy culture. We are easily thrown off balance by the speed of life, interruptions, and distractions. When we devote ourselves primarily to one dimension of life, it controls us and we miss out on so much of the rest of life.

Joan Chittister writes, "Life is made up of many parts. When we allow one part of it to become the whole of it, the other parts of our souls atrophy. We walk around half-dead and never even know it."

It may be a helpful exercise to list all the elements that fill our lives – and then make a list of what is left out. Include all dimensions of life – physical (exercise, healthy eating); social (family, friends); emotional (suppport, self-care, fun); spiritual (worship; prayer; devotions); intellectual (learning; reading). What is consuming us? What is missing? We cannot always change the circumstances of life, but we can change our response to them.

Our God is always making all things new. The Psalmist encourages us to place the pieces of our lives before God, that God might help us find balance, wholeness, and holiness of life:

"God made my life complete when I placed all the pieces before him.

When I got my act together, he gave me a fresh start.

Now I'm alert to God's ways; I don't take God for granted.

Every day I review the way he works; I try not to miss a trick.

I feel put back together, and I'm watching my step.

God rewrote the text of my life when I opened the book of my heart to his eyes."

May you breathe deeply of God's healing Spirit, receiving the life-giving power and renewing energy of our Creator. May God grant you balance and holy, wholesome living.

CA Council on Alcohol Problems Director to Preach

In July 2005, the Rev. James Butler was selected to fill the position of Executive Director of the California Council on Alcohol Problems (CalCAP), and affiliated associations, Alcohol-Narcotic Education Foundation (ANEF), and the California Coalition Against Gambling Expansion (CCAGE). These Sacramento-based organizations are statewide, faith-based groups that address the CA Legislature and raise public awareness. They use education, research, lobbying and advocacy to help prevent the moral, economic, scientific and social problems caused by alcohol and gambling.

CalCAP continues to take an active and leading role in addressing the problems of alcohol in general and of underage drinking specifically. CCAGE monitors and addresses legislation related to gambling. This is one of the agencies LUMC supports with our holiday offerings.

Rev. Butler, a United Methodist minister, has served churches in Southern California. He will preach at both services on Sunday, February 18.

"God @ Ground Zero, How Good Overcame Evil....One Heart at a Time" by Chaplain Ray Giunta

This is the riveting account of criminal investigator-turned-crisis-chaplain as he spends 68 life-changing days at Ground Zero, the heart of the worst terrorist attack in American history. Within hours of arrival, he enters the barricaded Ground Zero site with befriended firefighters. There he is an eyewitness and confessor to the heroic and horrific, to the miraculous and macabre. Working the "third watch" wearing his hardhat with its chaplain's cross, he waits with the rescue workers, digs with them on the shifting rubble pile and leads processions of recovered bodies off the site. Lafayette United Methodist Church Church Council Meeting January 16, 2007

Present: Dean Coons, Jack Cotteral, Ginny Cowden, Joe Darrell, Tom Henderson, Pat Hershey, David Inglis, Ginny Leavitt, Robyn Roberts, Pastor Lori Sawdon, Carol Slatten and David White,

The meeting was called to order by Pat Hershey at 7:30 PM. Joys and concerns were shared along with self-introductions and reasons for attending. Pat led the group in prayer. The minutes of December 12, 2006 were approved unanimously.

Pastor Lori gave a devotion on the church council being "parts of the body of Christ" and all are important.

Pastor Lori introduced the book, <u>Christianity for the Rest of Us: How the Neighborhood Church is Transforming the Faith.</u> There are ten signposts of renewal and three of the signs; hospitality, discernment and healing were discussed at length by the council. Others on the list will be highlighted at future meetings.

Committee Reports

Staff-Parish Relations - Ginny Cowden announced upcoming vacation dates for the church secretary (3 days in March and 2 weeks in April) and for Pastor Lori (February 12 - 18). Pastor Lori has asked Rev. Jim Butler from the California Council on Alcohol Problems to speak. LUMC donates money to this council.

Lay Leadership - Pastor Lori announced that she plans to lift up the committees and members of those committees at services throughout the year. She plans to do this the third Sunday of the month and will introduce the Church Council this Sunday.

Finance - Ginny Leavitt announced that all itemized plans for year-end money were fulfilled; LUMC paid its shared mission giving and askings in full, funded a contingency account for \$1,850, and moved all leftover 2006 trustee budget money to 2007. In addition the year starts with \$20,000 in unbudgeted money. The fundraisers for 2007 were approved and will be the rummage sale in the spring and the silent auction in the fall.

- •David White distributed the financial reports for 2006 and announced that he is still in the process of cleaning up some accounts.
- •Ginny Leavitt gave the guidelines for use of the special donation (\$10,000) to board meeting attendees who didn't already have them. Tom asked that the good news about LUMC finances be put in the Tower Notes.

Program Council - Robyn Roberts announced that the first meeting of this group will take place this Sunday. She also reported that the warm coat collection was very successful and St. Vincent de Paul appreciated the donations.

Trustees - Joe Darrell announced that he has been elected Chair of the Trustees for 2007 with Greg Horner, vice chair and Jim Brown, secretary. Greg Horner fixed the ovens in the kitchen and Brian Chuck got the heating system in the Fireside Rooms working. Joe reported that the annual tour of the church campus to identify and prioritize Trustee projects will take place the first Saturday in February. The arrangement with the valet parking company is continuing even though they haven't started parking yet; all money raised will go to parking lot maintenance. The beautification team headed by the Lennstroms will be discussing the opening up of the front of the church property. The trees will probably be shaped.

The group discussed starting meetings at 7 p.m. but decided by consensus to keep the time at 7:30 p.m.

Communications

It was pointed out that an article in The Connection discussed the changed apportionment formula. Basically LUMC has had their assessment reduced but the conference has asked the larger churches (including LUMC) to pay more than their allotment if possible.

The change in the pastor's pension formula was changed by the General Conference and adversely affects pastors living in parsonages as opposed to receiving housing allowances. Further research will be done on this matter.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:05 p.m. The next meeting will be Tuesday, February 20 at 7:30 p.m.
