SEEDS OF A SOWER

The ending of the school year tends to bring changes to many lives: students moving to higher grades, sometimes even new schools; young adults graduating and moving on to the working world or higher education. Change is a constant factor in our lives.

Recently I listened to a podcast of a KQED Forum featuring the authors of a new book titled, *This Is Not the Life I Ordered: 50 Ways to keep your head above water when life keeps dragging you down.* One of the chapters is called, "Learning to Live with Change." The authors suggest a series of questions to shape the "first response" to life-changing events. The questions help them stay focused on constructive responses instead of panicky reactions.

- What's the Good News in This Situation? The question itself tells your mind (and your attitude) that there is a positive side just waiting to be uncovered. The question focuses mental energy on finding an optimistic instead of a pessimistic interpretation.
- What Actions Could I Take That Would Benefit All Involved? The question reminds you that while you may not control what's happened, you control how you respond to what's happened. It helps you concentrate on actions that serve you and others instead of going to the "dark side" and wallowing in how unfair or undeserved this situation may be.
- Who (or What) Could Help Me Out in This Situation? The question helps you remember that you are never alone. The world is filled with people who can help you resolve your issues if you'll just ask for assistance. (pp. 140-141)

These questions might be helpful to all as we move through the changing seasons of life.





During the Rummage Sale, the comment was made to me - "Why not just ask everyone to give an additional \$30, then you wouldn't need to go to all this work to have a Rummage Sale?" My response to that is "Writing a check doesn't build Community, working together on a project does!" We did more that just hold a Rummage Sale in Mid May - we worked together, we laughed together, we teased each other, we ate together, we prayed together, we got to know each other better, - and we raised money not only for the mission of our own church, but for several other charitable organizations, too. First, so many of you got your closets, garages, etc. cleared of no longer needed articles, articles that are now being used, many of them by people who might not be able to afford them otherwise. We sent two floor fans upstairs to the Ed. Building for use on those hot days, some items went directly to the kitchen, baskets were set aside for Christmas, Easter, and the Silent Auction, some very nice items were saved for the Silent Auction, 15 bags of clothing went to Goodwill (before we even opened the Sale - more about that next year!), left-over children's clothing and equipment went to the Oakland Museum's fundraisers, some books went to Books for Barrios, some items went to the Rescue Mission, to Herrick Hospital, Friends Outside, Lincoln Child Center, The Garret (John Muir Hospital's Thrift Shop), and lastly all other leftovers were packed and taken by members of our neighbor church, Christian Community Church, for their Rummage Sale on June 2 Yes, the Rummage Sale was work, and I did get tired, but it was a very rewarding experience, and as you can see, we did much more that raise \$4600 for LUMC.

What is Vacation Bible School? It is a day camp for kids, ages 3 through 8th grade, to be held at our church, July 30 through Aug. 3, from 9 a.m. to noon. The children will be divided by age, preschoolers, kindergarten and first graders, second and third graders, fourth and fifth graders, and middle schoolers. Each group will have an adult and teen as class leaders. We open with wonderful, fun, happy singing, lead by Sarah Mohr and her guitar, and a skit, lead by our teenagers, and a mission moment where we share such things as books or food items with those less fortunate than ourselves. We then move to classrooms for a Bible story and discussion, and then spend the rest of the morning at stations, doing crafts, eating snacks, playing games, singing again, and watching more skits. We end with more songs and prayer. The preschoolers, of course, have their own program to fit their age, in the preschool rooms. The middle-schoolers, of course, also have their own program, in which they actually participate in different daily mission projects, such as sorting food at the Food Bank or hosting a party for Las Trampas Inc. From 75 -100 kids usually participate, and it is an exciting week. This year our theme is SonForce Kids - Special Agents for God, and our Bible verse is Joshua 1:9. "Be strong

and courageous... for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go." What a wonderful message for our children today! The church will be fully decorated in a space-age manner, complete with planets and spaceships. We invite all the children of our church to participate, and their friends. We are looking forward to another amazing summer of service on four Indian reservations, in South Los Angeles, and in Honduras. We currently have over 1,500 youth and adults registered to participate in our 2007 projects!

Lafayette United Methodist Church Council Minutes - May 15, 2007

The meeting began at 7:30. Those present were: Pat Hershey, Joe Darrell, David Inglis, Tom Henderson, Ginny Leavitt, Doug Cowden, Ginny Cowden, Dave White, Carol Slatten, Pastor Lori Sawdon, and Mary Hobson.

Joys and concerns were shared. Chairperson Pat Hershey led us in prayer. The minutes of April 17, 2007 were distributed. Joe Darrell moved that the minutes be approved. David White seconded. All approved.

Pastor Lori led a devotional based on one of the 10 signposts from Christianity for the Rest of Us. In Goleta Presbyterian Church in California, the pastor says that they have a polyculture, and many different ways of being Christian. Pastor asked if we are open to diversity. Discussion followed. She reminded us that Diversity is a signpost of renewal.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Staff Parish Relations - Ginny Cowden reported that the shortfall related to the Clergy Pension Plan and Pastor Lori's salary is not as large as anticipated. Ginny moved to rescind the motion made at last month's meeting regarding extra compensation. Carol Slatten seconded and all approved.

Lay Leadership - no report

Finance Committee - Ginny Leavitt reported that the Stewardship Committee was being formed and Robyn Roberts and Pat Hershey will represent Finance for that committee. Finance Committee has requested that people submit a request for reimbursement for expenses rather than take it out of the income from any activity, so there will be a paper trail. We have a preliminary audit from Joyce. Ginny also reported that Finance Committee approved another Candle Workshop for October, 2007. There have been two requests for "matching funds"--Ronald Sutherland for music software, and Worship Committee for Jazz in July. The Endowment Committee sent out grant forms. Monies are available for requests.

Treasurer's Report - Dave White passed out the Treasurer's report. We are in good shape as of today. He also reported that he upgraded the computer program to Quick Books 2007. **Trustees** - The projects discussed at the April meeting have been completed. No meeting is scheduled for June or August.

NEW BUSINESS - Pat and Pastor Lori agreed that we did not need to meet in June or August, but this would be subject to change if needed.

- •To honor the retiring District Superintendent, Jim Lockwood-Stewart, there will be a Farewell Celebration on June 3rd at 4pm at Taylor United Methodist Church in Oakland, as well as a concert at San Ramon Valley UMC on June 8^{th.} The concert will feature Jim playing the bassoon, with his son Andrew also participating. The concert will support the work of the Wesley Foundation.

Since there were no other communication items, Ginny Leavitt moved the meeting be closed. Doug Cowden seconded. All in favor.
