Seeds of A Sower

The Council of Bishops and leaders of various agencies across the United Methodist Church are proposing to General Conference four areas of focus for the denomination. Guiding questions that have led to these areas of focus were:

What is the United Methodist vision for living Wesley's principles – doing no harm, doing good, and loving God?

How does that vision enable us to fulfill the church's mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world?

The areas of focus are:

- 1. **Developing principled Christian leaders for the church and the world.** The church must recruit young people for ministry and provide them with the skills necessary to be effective in this new time of opportunity. That includes women and people of color the world over. Similarly, we must offer leadership training for lay people who are in ministry in countless ways.
- 2. Creating new places for new people by starting new congregations and renewing existing ones. If we are to remain faithful to our commitment to transform the world, we will reach out with genuine hospitality to people wherever they are. We will make them feel welcome as we start new faith communities, seek to renew existing ones and inspire faithful discipleship.
- 3. **Engaging in ministry with the poor.** As an expression of our discipleship, United Methodists seek to alleviate conditions that undermine quality of life and limit the opportunity to flourish as we believe God intends for all. As with John Wesley, we seek to change conditions that are unjust, alienating and disempowering. We engage in ministry with the poor, and in this, we especially want to reach out to and protect children.
- 4. Stamping out killer diseases by improving health globally. Conditions of poverty cause illness and death. The lack of access to doctors, nurses, medications and appropriate facilities is deadly, especially among those who live in conditions of poverty. But the diseases of poverty are not inevitable. We believe the people of The United Methodist Church can play a significant role in educating others about diseases such as HIV/AIDS and malaria, and treating and preventing their devastating effects.

These are bold initiatives, but certainly congruent with our Wesleyan heritage. As we pool our resources of time, talent, and treasure as a denomination, we can make a difference in the world today, as we have in the past. They have the potential for enabling us to transcend our disagreements and unite us in meaningful mission. These areas provide direction not simply for The United Methodist Church at-large, but can also provide guidance for the mission of each local congregation, including ours!

LUMC Church Council Meeting Minutes

April 15, 2008

Present: Chairperson Pat Hershey, Pastor Lori Sawdon, Robyn Roberts, Carol Slatten, Ginny Leavitt, Pat Porter, Dean Coons, Jack Cotteral, David Inglis, Tom Henderson, Ginny Cowden, Doug Cowden, Vic Smith, Secretary Kurt Teichmann **Also Present:** Greg Horner representing Trustees

The minutes of the March 18, 2008 meeting were approved by consensus. Going forward, it was agreed that correction and reaching approval by email was the most efficient way to finalize Committee Minutes. It was also agreed that if there were substantive issues with the minutes, it would be preferable to delay finalization of the Council minutes and have the minutes discussed at the next Church Council Meeting.

<u>Staff Parish Report</u> Pat Porter said that the Committee had received a guidebook of national statistics of pay for various church positions. The guidebook is extensive but may not reflect California compensation levels. The Committee is still trying to get more local data for compensation of church administrators and custodians. Porter noted that Custodian Jason Cano has requested leave from June through August to take educational courses. He has found substitute Brian Swayze. The question arose of who would clean and wax the Ed Building and Fellowship Hall floors and when. Porter will follow to be sure it is done before this summer.

Lay Leadership Report No Report

Finance Committee Report Ginny Leavitt reported that the Church continues to be in very good financial position. YTD pledges are nearly \$4,000 over budget. There was an increase in non-pledged giving in March causing the YTD total to exceed budget by \$1,300. Other-use-of-the-church income exceeded budget as well. The Easter offering of \$4,005 exceeded the budget estimate of \$2,350. In addition, there was a rollover from principally 2006 but also 2007 totaling \$33,600. Expenses were \$4,000 under budget. Tempering all this good financial news is that some members make their annual donation in January skewing the giving and a false impression of greatly increased giving. The budget includes only a portion of our annual apportionments, which we would like to fund in full again this year. Not included is \$24,000 Conference Askings, which are more discretionary, but which we hope to fund in a sense of Christian compassion. ••Ginny Leavitt further reported that our new bookkeeper continues to get better and better. Leavitt noted that we are no longer using "Profit and Loss" but are using Revenues, Expenses and Net Income. This is more appropriate for a nonprofit organization. Our outside auditor has met with our bookkeeper, Pastor Lori and Ginny Leavitt and had very minor review matters. The Auditor promised to final her audit within 6 weeks.

Trustees Committee Report Greg Horner stated that the Trustees could put all available funds into church facility repair and improvement. He reported that Trustees had bought additional tables for the rummage sale. Repairing the lighting in the parking area is the top priority. Trustees has started obtaining bids tied to descriptions of scope of work to be done. Remaining work to be done at the parsonage include landscaping and repairing the irrigation system. The fascia on the outside wall of the Fellowship Hall needs to be repaired; two contractors' proposals have been submitted. Joyful Beginnings Pre-School has agreed to pay for repainting their three rooms of the Education Building. Trustees is planning to engage our landscaping firm to keep the parking lot clean for an additional \$40/month. Increased supervision of this contractor's work is planned.

Program Council Report No Report

<u>Stewardship Committee</u> The Finance Committee including Ginny Leavitt has begun to form a committee. Robyn Roberts has agreed to chair it.

Old Business

Roberts's Rules of Order were briefly discussed. Pastor Lori expressed her desire that all committee meetings reflect our experiencing God's Love. It was suggested that we often think of "What would Jesus Do." It was generally agreed that we should raised our consciousness of the God Question, that the Holy Spirit is with us so that our meetings can be a spiritual experience.

New Business

Our District Supervisor has encouraged us to contact inactive members to try encourage them to become active again or, if not, to purge their names from our membership rolls. A list of 35 people was reviewed. Pastor Lori noted that we do not have an Evangelism & Church Growth Committee. It was agreed this would be beneficial. Anyone interested in working on such a committee should contact Pastor Lori.

Communications

The City of Lafayette has set 4 dates for residents to make recommend-ations for its Downtown Strategy. Those dates are May 1,3,12, and 17. Anyone interested is encouraged to attend.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 p.m.
