SEEDS OF A SOWER

The General Conference of the United Methodist Church met in Fort Worth around a wooden communion table fashioned of trees destroyed by Hurricane Katrina. The Conference began on the 40th anniversary to the day of the when the Evangelical United Brethren Church united with the Methodist Church to form the United Methodist Church.

In the ten days of meetings, the assembly approved a \$642 million denominational budget for the next four year. Four areas of focus for the immediate future are:

- •Developing principled Christian leaders.
- •Creating new places for new people by starting new congregations and renewing existing ones.
- •Engaging in ministries with the poor.
- •Improving global health, especially attacking the killer diseases of poverty.

William H. Gates Sr., co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, thanked the denomination for being a partner in the *Nothing But Nets* campaign to eliminate malaria in Africa. More than \$20 million has been raised since the campaign began in 2006.

A hymnal revision committee was created to bring a proposed hymnal to the 2012 General Conference.

Delegates urged U.S. lawmakers to ensure that immigration laws don't tear families apart, and they advocated for "full protection of all workers." Stating that Israel continues to violate international law by building a wall on Palestinian land, the conference called upon Israelis and Palestinians to uphold U.N. resolutions and International Court of Justice rulings. On the 100th anniversary of the Social Creed, delegates decided that a proposed new creed would serve the church better as a "companion litany."

The body generally retained the church's stances on homosexuality, including the declaration in the church's Social Principles that homosexual practice is "incompatible with Christian teaching."

Delegates opened the door to significant structural changes as the church works to address its increasingly global nature. It tweaked the denomination's mission statement to read: "The mission of the church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

People who join United Methodist churches henceforth will promise to be faithful in "their witness" as well as in their "prayers, their presence, their gifts and their service."


