No classes on JAZZ IN JUNE Sunday the 22nd. Bring the whole family to the service in Fellowship Hall!



July 27 Families are invited to worship together in Fellowship Hall.




#### FRIENDSHIP TIME PREPARATION

Volunteers in Mission are needed in Fernley, Nevada this summer. Early Saturday morning, January 5, 2008, a 30' section of the Truckee Canal breached, flooding an area of approximately two square miles.

Over 500 homes in Fernley's southeast neighborhoods filled with water anywhere from 6 inches to 8 feet deep, with 3-4 feet in the majority of homes. The homeowners will need sheetrock, paint and other materials to repair flood-damaged homes. Our annual conference disaster response efforts will be focused on long-term recovery for those homeowners who have no other resources to rebuild their homes and their lives.



#### Lafayette United Methodist Church Minutes of the Church Council Meeting

Of May 20, 2008

**Present:** Chairperson Pat Hershey, Pastor Lori Sawdon, Robyn Roberts, Carol Slatten, Ginny Leavitt, Pat Porter, Jack Cotteral, David Inglis, Tom Henderson, Ginny Cowden, Doug Cowden, Secretary Kurt Teichmann

The meeting was called to order at 7:32 p.m.

Chairperson Hershey led us in prayer asking that committee members might discern God's will as we do his work.

The minutes of the April 15th, 2008 meeting were approved by consensus.

Staff Parish Report Pat Porter passed out the Committee's newly revised Lay Staff Vacation/Holiday Policy for Church Council's review. It was agreed that the policy should be read over the next month and considered for approval at the next CC Meeting. Porter reported that the Committee had completed its review of church staff employees' compensation. Three local, comparable-sized churches shared their employees' compensation for our study. As a result of the study, it was determined that church administrator Lori Sullivan's pay was below other churches. Motion to increase her pay by 10% as of July 1<sup>st</sup>. Made by Porter, seconded by Henderson. Approved unanimously.

#### Lay Leadership Report No Report

Finance Committee Report Ginny Leavitt reported that the Church continues to be in very good financial position. YTD pledges are close to budget. [Note that budget numbers are on an historical basis month by month rather than simply 1/12 of the annual figures.] Non-pledged giving continued strong in April causing the YTD total to exceed budget by \$4,400. Other-use-of-the-church income exceeded budget as well. May will be even better since Acalanes check has just been received. Expenses remain in line. Starting next month, the unbudgeted share of our apportionments and desired Askings contributions will be included in the budget as budget items, which we hope to be able to pay. This will yield greater clarity to our financial position.

- •Ginny Leavitt said that she and the bookkeeper were continuing to simplify the church's balance sheet. Chairperson Hershey complimented Ginny Leavitt on her work. It was noted that Leavitt is not an accountant so her job working with a new bookkeeper has had extra challenges, which she has impressively met.
- •Leavitt reported that the 2007 financial statements audit took place in March, a record in recent memory! The church is in fine shape. Joyce, the accountant's bill was \$960. Motion to divide the cost 2/3 to LUMC and 1/3 to Joyful Beginnings was made by Tom Henderson and seconded by Doug Cowden. It was noted that this has traditionally been the split and reflected the relative complexities of the two entities. Motion approved unanimously. **Trustees Committee Report** Pastor Lori reported for Trustees. They have signed a \$4,500 contract to have the fascia on the outside of the Fellowship Hall repaired. Trustees is getting bids on the parking lot lights and other parking lot matters; the cost may be as high as \$2,500. The parsonage watering system has been replaced. Trustees is forming sub-committees to handle various projects.

Program Council Report No Report

Old Business None

**New Business** Pastor Lori proposed that the Council be given copies of <u>Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations</u> to read. She noted other congregations are reading the book and finding it useful with tie-ins to the Stewardship Campaign. There was a general consensus in favor.

The question was raised if absentees from Council meetings should be listed in the minutes. It was noted that committee attendance was good and that attendees received recognition in the minutes. Motion to not list absences was approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:32 p.m.
