### SEEDS OF A SOWER

At the recent California-Nevada Annual Conference in Sacramento, LUMC made the news!! Each year a statistical analysis of the 352 churches in our region is presented. For the 2007 calendar year, the average church membership is 236; average worship attendance is 111; average church school attendance is 25.

LUMC made several "Top Twenty" Lists!!

#14 in New Members through Profession of Faith – 20 (this was our confirmation class) #14 in Number of Persons Baptized – 14 were baptized!!

#11 in Persons from Church School/Formation Groups Becoming Members – 20 #2 in Worship Attendance Gain – our average worship attendance increased by 36, from 131 to 167!! (Our 2008 worship attendance is averaging 165 each Sunday as of June 22.)

#16 in Worship Attendance Percentage Gain – 27% gain!

#13 in Church Membership Gain – overall a net gain of 19 members, a 7% increase from 284 to 303.

(FYI to complete the comparisons to the average church, our average church school attendance is 34!)

We also paid 100% of our Shared Mission Giving to the Conference and The United Methodist Church for the joint ministries we share locally and globally.

Congratulations, People of God! These are signs of your commitment to growing and serving as disciples of Jesus Christ! Worship is our primary gathering place as the family of God. In worship we are empowered and energized for our daily lives and service to God. We receive the prayerful support of one another's presence. Our spirits are lifted by music. In the absence of worship, our spiritual lives begin to atrophy. We can lose our faith bearings.

While the statistics are exciting and one sign of the health of the congregation, we can't afford to "rest on our laurels." Our Church Council members are reading a book called, *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations*. The author, Bishop Robert Schnase, writes:

"Vibrant, fruitful growing congregations don't stop at practicing *friendly* hospitality, *helpful* service and mission, or *prudent* generosity. Their practices are extraordinary, exceptional, thorough, and extreme; they are radical, passionate, intentional, risk-taking, and extravagant....No church that is vibrant, fruitful, and growing performs its ministry exactly as it did in the 1950's, and no pastor leading such a congregation is practicing ministry as she or he did in the 1970s or 1980s. Effective congregations change, improve, learn, and adapt to fulfill their mission, and these words push us to rethink our basic congregational culture, organization, and practice."

Standing on a firm foundation, LUMC is a congregation that can meet that challenge to change, improve, learn, and adapt. I'm grateful to be appointed for a fifth year of ministry with you as we live into the mission to which God is calling us.



#### **CONFERENCE REPORT**

EXTENDING CHRIST'S INVITATION FOR A JOYOUS LIFE . . .

... and creating an artful presence was the theme of this year's California-Nevada Annual conference held in Sacramento June 17 - 21, 2008. Pastor Lori, Celeste Graham and myself attended and thank you for your support. Legislatively it was a fairly quiet year due to the fact that the Quadrennial General Conference had just been held in April. Bishop Beverly Shamana is retiring this year so this was her last conference and much of the ambience was created by her artistic influence. Each day featured a different artist who created an "artful presence" with demonstrations of various art forms. The most fun aspects of this emphasis on art were the various moments during the conference when the entire group experienced "poetus interruptus" - several persons read a favorite poem about 4 times each day. There were three booths situated in the hall, the first being the "Art of the Family" tent featuring art from the Bishop, her mother and two sisters; "Gourd Blessings Area" where members were asked to write on a gourd shard (prepared by

LUMC) which the Bishop will use in a future work of art; and the "Artist in Residence" tent where each day a different artist was featured. Hilda Robinson, painter, Mark Bollwinkle, potter, Martina Young, dancer and Charlene Virts, weaver not only shared their work but allowed the delegates to participate through crayons, Play-doh, movement and string weaving during the conference.

This was the year for the Episcopal election. Methodist Bishops are a part of the whole church and they are elected and assigned at the jurisdictional level. Each Annual Conference elects its nominees for Episcopal election. This year there were 6 persons eligible for election. Five ballots were interspersed during the first two days and Rev. Thomas (Ted) Virts and Rev. Renae Extrum-Fernandez (our District Superintendent) were eventually elected.

Section assignments were randomly made prior to the conference and legislative items assigned to the sections. During section meetings assigned items were debated and votes taken with items receiving more than 85% yea or nay placed on the Consent Calendar that was later voted on without discussion by the entire body. Only two items were not on the consent calendar, Items 20 and 21 involving marriage equality in California and the intent of over 70 retired clergy to perform same gender marriages and Holy unions. Some of the items discussed and generally supported were withdrawal from Iraq, ending the death penalty, and supporting energy conservation.

Again this year the Fixing of Appointments was announced throughout the conference with our Bay View district reading occurring on Thursday afternoon. As each pastor's name is read he/she stands followed by laying-on-of-hands with all delegates participating while the Bishop leads prayer. Celeste and I made sure we were able to reach Pastor Lori and extremely thankful she was reappointed to LUMC.

Another highlight this year was the address by keynote speaker Jim Winkler the General Secretary of General Board of Church and Society. We were privileged to hear him again when we attended the MFSA dinner (and were greeted by Dean and Chris Coons). We also received greetings and send you greetings from Sarge Wright, Gil Vieira, Mark Wendland and Ruth Darling.

Saturday morning the conference accepted the Conference Nominating Report and Celeste Graham was elected to serve on the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. There were so many wonderful presentations, many videos, uplifting music and inspirational moments. Celeste and I attended the Bayview District dinner, the Christian Unity and Inter-religious Concerns luncheon, the MFSA dinner, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry luncheon, the UMW breakfast, and the Conference Committee on Reconciling luncheon - all of these featured special speakers and remarkably good food. Again we thank you for sending us.

#### EASTER OFFERING THANK YOU

The General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church has expressed gratitude for our gift of \$200 for the Global HIV/AIDS Program of the United Methodist Committee on Relief. The United Methodist Global AIDS Fund was established by General Conference in 2004 with a goal of raising at least \$8 million from 2005 to 2008.

Today we live in a world in which five people die of AIDS every minute and nine people more are infected by HIV. The General Board of Global Ministries has responded to the HIV/AIDS crisis through programs of awareness, care, and support. Awareness programs include health education workshops for youth, women, pastors, and lay leaders in United Methodist churches in the United States, Africa, Asia, and Latin America; HIV/AIDS focus papers and World AIDS Day resources. Care ministries include home-based care programs including distribution of the Healthy Homes, Healthy Families Kit in Africa and encouraging congregations to "Covenant to Care" by welcoming people with HIV/AIDS and their loved ones. Support ministries include undergirding programs for children orphaned by AIDs, such as paying for their school fees and basic necessities, and assisting selected United Methodist Hospitals through a revitalization program.
