SEEDS OF A SOWER

Our recent focus on Radical Hospitality raised awareness that first impressions of a church are generally established within the first minutes of arriving on campus. Research shows that visitors decide very quickly whether or not they are welcome in a house of worship. Here's a reminder of ways we can offer hospitality to newcomers:

The circle of 10: talk to and learn the names of everyone you don't know who is in a 10 foot radius of where you are sitting.

The rule of 3: Talk to people you don't know for the first 3 minutes after worship. During worship, identify people you do not know and make a determined effort to talk to them within 3 minutes of the conclusion of worship.

Talk to people you don't know during greeting time.

If you're not certain if the person is new, try this: *Hi, my name is* _____. *Help me remember your name.* Then ask about jobs, hobbies, interests, places you and they have lived.

If they are new to the community, ask them if they have any needs or suggestions as they settle in.

Greet someone in the parking lot as you walk in or introduce yourself to those who are already seated when you walk in the sanctuary (if worship hasn't already started!).

Leave the parking spaces in the front entry for newcomers and disabled.

Help keep our campus clean and neat. Pick up a piece of trash as you walk in. Please don't dump things at the church thinking that someone might use it someday. I've been spending more time recently cleaning up messes and tossing clutter to keep our facilities looking tidy.

I received a nice compliment about our congregation from a clergy colleague who worshiped here while I was on vacation. He noted that several folks greeted his family and they felt genuinely welcome. Let's keep up the good work!

Risk-Taking Mission and Service - Extravagant Generosity



We Welcome Bishop Warner H. Brown, Jr.

Bishop Warner H. Brown, Jr. Takes his place as Resident Bishop of the San Francisco Area, California-Nevada Annual Conference, on Sept. 1, 2008. Bishop Brown is returning to this conference, from which he was elected to the episcopacy, after serving the Denver Area since 2000.

In 1973 Brown was ordained a Deacon in the Baltimore Annual Conference. He transferred to the Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference and was appointed as both pastor of a church and Director of Bethany House Ministries in Pittsburgh, a social service ministry for two housing projects. He next was appointed Senior Pastor at Warren United Methodist Church in Pittsburgh. While serving in Pennsylvania, he was ordained an Elder in the Western Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church. Then, in 1979, he answered a national search for an associate conference staff position in the California-Nevada Annual Conference, and transferred there. Once in California, it was only six months later that internal staff changes opened the door to his stepping up to serve as Conference Council Director.

From this role of having program and administrative oversight for the conference, Brown was appointed just four years later to the superintendency of the Golden Gate District, the richly diverse area around San Francisco. Then – again, after only four years – he was given the charge of Taylor Memorial U.M.C. in Oakland, California. As the congregation was experiencing a significant turn-around, the Loma Prieta Earthquake and subsequent fires assaulted the Oakland community. Brown led the community's ecumenical disaster response, serving as chairperson of the Oakland Inter-religious Network.

Following an 11-year pastorate in Oakland, Brown was given a new challenge as Senior Pastor of the First U.M.C. of Bakersfield, California. Only two years into this pastorate, he was nominated and endorsed by the Annual Conference Session for the episcopacy. At the July, 2000 Western Jurisdiction Conference Sessions in Casper, Wyoming, he was elected a bishop of The United Methodist Church and assigned to the Denver Episcopal Area (covering Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Montana, and parts of Idaho).

In July, 2008, at the Western Jurisdiction Conference Sessions in Portland, Oregon, Bishop Brown was reassigned to the California-Nevada Annual Conference (covering northern California and Nevada).

Greeting Cal-Nevada after his eight-year absence, Bishop Brown says, "From what I have learned, you have been actively striving to gain clarity about the conference vision, 'Passion in Jesus Christ, Compassion for All.' I look forward to partnering with you to build on that vision as we continue to do the work of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."






MEMORIAL GIFTS DONATED

LUMC Church Council Meeting, August 19, 2008

Present: Chairperson Pat Hershey, Pastor Lori Sawdon, Robyn Roberts, Carol Slatten, Ginny Leavitt, Pat Porter, Dean Coons, Jack Cotteral, David Inglis, Doug Cowden, Ginny Cowden, Doug Cowden, Secretary Kurt Teichmann

Also Present: Chris Coons

After the sharing of Joys and Concerns, Chairperson Hershey gave a centering prayer. She then opened the meeting at 7:35 p.m.

The minutes of the June 17, 2008 meeting were approved as submitted.

Finance Committee Report

Ginny Leavitt reported that the Stewardship Committee will be needing a budget for its fall pledge campaign.

- ••Leavitt reported that the Church pledge income was below budget for July, the first time this year. Non-pledge giving and plate offerings were once again above budget. Other income was on target. Leavitt noted that one member has begun designating her donation for Community Outreach so the church has created a new income/asset category for Missions-Community Outreach so that these funds can be tracked and used only for that purpose. Expenses through July were about \$19,000 below budget. Leavitt noted that Joyful Beginnings had reimbursed the church for workman's comp expense for Joyful Beginnings employees. On a YTD basis, the church net income is \$51,470 above budget.
- ••Leavitt reported that Joe Darrell had reviewed the church's investment accounts. He recommended that we close the Wachovia accounts and consolidate the accounts at U.S. Bank, which has been giving us excellent personal service and better interest rates. He recommended that the Smith Barney account be reduced to \$3,000 but kept open to facilitate disposition of any members' stock gifts. Motion to approve by Dean Coons, Seconded by Pat Porter. Approved unanimously.
- ••In conjunction with the deposit account review, Trustees had prepared a schedule listing LUMC's investment accounts. The signers on each account are listed by their church titles. It was agreed that this will facilitate updating accounts with changing of officers.
- ••Ginny distributed copies of the LUMC Finance Policy. This is a document that Finance Committee has been writing and editing over the last several months. It puts into writing in one document the financial policies of our church. The Policy was accepted by the Church Council and will be placed in the Office Policy Book
- ••A church member has suggested that the triangle plot behind the Fellowship Hall be fixed up as a memorial garden for deceased members and close relatives. It was agreed that any plans would have to be approved by the Conference which technically owns the property. Pastor Lori will discuss with the Conference. Dean Coons and Ginny Leavitt will ascertain what other local churches are doing.

Staff Parish Report

Pat Porter reported that Bunny Gruen will return as music director. She will attend the 10:30 Sunday services.

Lay Leadership Report

The Committee has started to meet and is developing nominations for church posts for the next calendar year.

Program Committee Report

The Worship Committee is planning a Homecoming on September 7th.

Trustees Committee Report

Joyful Beginnings and part of the nursery has been repainted. With a new color scheme, it almost looks new! The lighting in the parking lot has been replaced. There are new lights in the Pastor's Office.

Old Business - None

New Business

- ••Carol Slatten reported that she and Celeste Graham attended the Annual Conference. They were given a questionnaire to evaluate the Church's Vital Signs. A committee of 3 or 4 members will be selected to complete it. Pat Hershey, Pat Porter and Robyn Roberts volunteered for the committee.
- ••The book <u>Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations</u> will be incorporated into 5 church services beginning in September. In addition, Church Council will review one chapter each at the next five CC meetings.
- ••Bishop Shamana sent a Thank You note for our church's overall support for her retirement celebration. This includes our financial contribution, Pastor Lori's work on a planning committee and the over 1,000 gourds we prepared for the celebration. Church Council recognized Pastor Lori for her hours of preparing gourd shards.

Communications

LUMC has sent a letter to developer Eden Housing supporting the need for senior housing and programs and stating LUMC's involvement and past contributions. The purpose was to assist Eden Housing in securing federal funding for its project.
