### SEEDS OF A SOWER

The season of Advent begins on November 30. The origins of the season are somewhat fuzzy. Epiphany, celebrated on January 6, was probably an older celebration than that of Christmas. Advent likely grew out of the practice of a 40 day season of preparation for Epiphany, when baptisms were celebrated.

Eventually the Roman church created the commemorative day of Christmas, designating the four weeks prior to December 25 as Advent. Advent comes from *adventus* and refers to the "coming of Christ." It looks back to the historical presence of Jesus of Nazareth on Earth. It refers to the present coming of Christ into our very lives. It also refers to the future coming of Christ, when the reign of God will be accomplished in all its fullness.

It has commonly been thought that Christmas was dated in December to usurp the pagan solstice celebration. However, there is also evidence that it was based on the ancient belief that the date of death is also the date of conception. Early in the Christian calendar, Jesus' date of death was commemorated on March 25. If his conception was also March 25, then nine months later is December 25.

During this Advent season we will be focusing on ways in which we are seeing God – in people, in the world, in the work for justice, in the Christ Child, and in the Light. I'd like to hear ways in which you have seen God and will use them in our worship liturgy. 
## BAY AREA CRISIS NURSERY Wrapping Thing Up At The Bay Area Crisis Nursery

LUMC Church Council Meeting - November 11, 2008 Meeting

Present: Chairperson Pat Hershey, Dean Coons, Carol Slatten, Ginny Leavitt, Pastor Lori Sawdon, Tom Henderson, Robyn Roberts, David Inglis, Ginny Cowden, Doug Cowden, Jack Cotteral and Secretary Kurt Teichmann

After the committee members shared joys and concerns, Chairperson Hershey opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. with a Centering Prayer. The minutes of the September 16, 2008 and October 21, 2008 meetings were approved as submitted.

### **Finance Committee:**

- •Ginny Leavitt reported that pledged giving for 2009 has not reached the goal for a balanced budget. Pledges received as of this date were \$65,000 below what was pledged for 2008 with about 30 pledges still outstanding. She noted that guite a few past individuals/families that pledged last year had not made their 2009 commitment. Thus, Finance was not in a position to recommend a budget for next year. In view of that, Finance was recommending the status quo for all expenses for next year including the same compensation for our pastor except for a necessary increase in pastor's insurance expense. No budget will be presented to the Church Conference this coming Sunday. Leavitt reported that the church had done a mass email to all listed church givers to remind them to send in their annual pledges. The Finance Committee will follow with a letter to all who have not pledged, with phone calls to follow as needed. •Concerning the results of the first 10 months of 2008, Leavitt reported that pledges to date are right on expectations. Non-pledged income YTD is about \$3,000 below expectations. Plate offering continues to be strong, about \$300 over expectations. Use of the church income is about as expected. Acalanes has paid for the full year as have a couple of others users. Futures Explores continues to be a bonus with \$4,500 to date. The new designated Mission Outreach offering has already grown to \$800. In total, on a budget basis, income is \$13,570 ahead of budget.
- •With the rollover from last year, Total Income is \$43,985 ahead. This is very good news for this time of year. It is too early to estimate the roll over into 2009.
- •Leavitt reported that total expenses to date: Church Office is \$3,750 below budget; Church Home was also under by \$2,800, Church Family was \$2,000 under and Church Management was under by about \$12,000. Leavitt noted that since the bookkeeper had been on vacation, there had been some expense items that had not been paid making the above figures somewhat misleading. But we continue to be in good financial shape on a current accounts basis. The requested amounts for mission giving and askings are not included in these budget figures but will be added in the future. Thus, the church's positive cash flow may be considered to be over stated by those amounts.
- •The request by the Finance Committee for an exception to the Endowment Policy, which was tabled at the October meeting, has been withdrawn. The Endowment Committee has finished its consideration of the exception proposal. The Church Council has agreed to appoint a committee to review the Endowment Policy as a whole. **Trustees:** Pastor Lori reported that Trustees was considering insulating the attic roof in the education building at an estimated cost of \$2,000. This would improve the temperature in several cold rooms. The Fire Marshall's inspection found that we need to replace the kitchen oven hood, which is estimated at a cost of \$3,000 to \$4,000. Trustees are getting more bids. These funds are in the budget.

**Staff Parish:** Ginny Leavitt said that, right now, we don't have the money for any increases. Our pastor's family insurance cost has increased by approximately \$3,000 but otherwise her compensation is to remain the same. It was noted that after additional pledges were submitted, another church conference meeting could be scheduled to consider employee salary increases. And Trustees' additional requests will also be placed on hold.

- •Motion by Ginny Leavitt, Second by Doug Cowden that we retain the status quo on next year's budget until more pledge information is obtained to allow consideration of raises. This was approved unanimously.
- •After extended discussion, Jack Cotteral made a motion that Church Council be on record supporting the ban of use of alcohol on church property and that a more definitive policy should be written for consideration by the Church Conference. Seconded by David Inglis. Passed on a 9-2 vote with one abstention.

**Lay Leadership:** There was no report. A report is to be made at Sunday's Church Conference.

Old Business: None.

**New Business:** Chairperson Hershey reported that the Vital Signs Committee had completed its assessment. It found that LUMC is a growing church with some areas of exposure to continued health. It was recommended that we present the findings (especially the areas where we could focus more attention) to the Church Conference. In that regard, it was agreed that the Church should try to work even more concertedly to develop our intimacy with visitors, new members and even existing members. And this should be incorporated with a greater effort to provide more Adult Christian Education opportunities.

The next meeting is combined with the Finance Committee on December 9<sup>th</sup>. The meeting was adjourned at 9:32 p.m.
