SEEDS OF A SOWER

The beginning of a new year is often a time for evaluation – for looking back at where we have been and looking forward to fresh visions. Typically New Year's Resolutions focus on the outer life. I encourage you to contemplate the inner life, as well, specifically your spiritual life as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Several years ago Rev. Ken Carter developed Seven Questions for the Spiritual Journey, based on Stephen Covey's *Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*. I share his questions for your reflection.

- 1. Do I believe that God has placed unique gifts within me that might be used to help others, and that my primary fulfillment in life comes through the expression of these gifts?
- 2. Do I believe that I have been created in the image of God, and that my highest goal in life is to reclaim or recover my true identity as a child of God?
- 3. Do I understand that the implications of questions One and Two lead toward a life of discipline and discernment?
- 4. Do I understand that my well-being is linked to the well-being of others, that my salvation, healing, and growth are connected to the salvation, healing, and growth of others, especially those closest to me?
- 5. Do I understand that my life will be enriched by a willingness to embrace the perspectives of others?
- 6. Do I recognize that my understanding and expression of the Christian life is but one part of a whole, and that it is in the whole that Jesus Christ is glorified?
- 7. Do I recognize that I am called to grow into the likeness of Christ, and that my response to God's grace includes a disciplined personal life and a deepening relationship with Christ's body, the Church?

May the new year provide rich opportunities for your personal spiritual growth and service as disciples of Jesus Christ.



What have the youth been doing recently? Service, service, service and having fun while doing it.



The senior high snow retreat is scheduled for January 23-25 at the Schroter's cabin at Homewood. Permission slips are due January 18th.






M&M's

Coming Soon: The Way of Prayer






Cats in the Parsonage by Clair Shaffer, Jr.


A Gift to the Community - The Bethlehem Experience Reaches Many
