Seeds of a Sower

The Easter season of new life will soon evolve into Pentecost, the day when the gift of the Holy Spirit was given to the disciples and followers of Jesus so that the good news of God's love would continue to spread. It did indeed spread like wildfire in those days.

Here's Eugene Peterson's take on the impact of Pentecost from *The Message*: That day about three thousand took him at his word, were baptized and were signed up. They committed themselves to the teaching of the apostles, the life together, the common meal, and the prayers.

What a great summary of the life of the community of faith: spiritual growth with others, shared ministry and leadership, worship and communion, unity in prayer. These are the very elements that enrich and enliven the Christian community.

These days life seems to pull us in many different directions, claiming our time and energy. Pentecost is a great day to renew our commitment to our membership in the Body of Christ. When one member is absent, we all suffer. When all are present, all are enriched in our life together.

Holy Communion is one of the mystical ways in which the Holy Spirit unites us. As with meals shared with family and friends, communion is a meal shared with our brothers and sisters in Christ. A deeper bond is formed as we break bread together, recommit our lives to following Christ, and pray for the community of faith as members arise to partake of the bread and cup.

In light of recent health concerns, I want to inform you that our communion servers are supplied with sanitizers for hand washing just prior to serving communion. The servers are instructed to break pieces from the loaf or hand pieces to recipients of communion, to insure that only one person handles the bread. If your immune system is weak and you are reluctant to partake of the bread and cup, you may still come forward to receive a blessing from the servers.

I'm looking forward to the renewing winds of the Spirit this Pentecost.

LUMC RECYCLING EXPANDS

This month LUMC has embarked upon an expansion of our recycling program. You will notice blue recycle containers throughout the buildings. These containers are marked with signs indicating what is recyclable and what is not. Please note: this is a bit different than our home recycling!!

The following items can be deposited in the blue recycle containers:

Aluminum and Tin Cans, Aluminum Foil and Pie tins, Aerosol cans (empty and punctured only), Small Metal items, All Plastic Containers #1-#7 (lids ok), Glass Bottles and Jars (all colors), Magazines/Newspapers, Phone Books, Fax, Copies and Computer Paper, Carbonless Forms, Manila Folders and Envelopes, Paper Boxes, Cereal

and Shoe Boxes, Cardboard (cut to fit in cart).

The following items cannot be recycled here:

Metal Pipes or Plumbing fixtures, Garbage and Organic or Green Waste Materials, Styrofoam, Plastic bags, Hazardous waste, Restroom Waste, Ceramics, Window glass, Mirrors, Batteries, Electronic waste, Needles and Lancets.

Not only is this good stewardship of the environment, but it also assists our financial stewardship. Instead of paying for 3 yards of trash removal at a cost of \$415 a month, we will pay for 2 yards of trash removal and 1 yard of recyclables for a cost of \$337 a month, a savings of \$58 a month!

Please be conscientious in this endeavor. We don't want to spend the savings on additional custodial care to sort the trash from recyclables!!

With Passion in Jesus Christ, Compassion for All . . .

... we designate our 2009 Conference Offering for purchase of a John Deere tractor for West Angola.

Our Conference Offering this year will go to our West Angola Partnership – designated for purchase of a John Deere tractor, disc plow and cultivator for the Agricultural Training Farm near Porto Quipiri, north of Luanda.

The JD 5425 Utility Tractor is an 81hp 4WD commercial-grade tractor. It will be shipped directly to West Angola from Savannah, Georgia.

Along with the tractor, our Conference Offering will provide a:

- 3 point 3 gang disc plow
- 3 point 8' disc
- 3 point A-frame/toolbar/shank setup for row crops
- 3 point tilt and swing scraper
- 6' x 8' single axle field trailer



Donations received beyond the cost of the equipment will be used to buy trees, quality seed stock and hand tools.

The equipment will be instrumental in getting the planne3d Agricultural Training Farm up and running. The farm will provide jobs locally, increase food abundance and availability and serve as a demonstration farm to teach improved agricultural practices to the surrounding community and beyond.

Once crop production and markets are established, the food and profits for the agricultural production will provide financial support for the missions and ministries of the United Methodist Church.

Angola once was an exporter of food, but after 3 decades of civil war food prices are extremely high – and Luanda now ids ranked the world's most expensive city.

With 70% of the people earning less than \$1 per day, it is the youngest citizens who suffer most.

Porto Quipiri was the site of a refugee camp where 10 children died every day. UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) was instrumental in improving conditions at the camp and when the refugees were allowed to return home, many decided to remain in Porto Quipiri. They built a Methodist Church/school building there which continues to serve the new community that they created.

Bishop Gadspar Domingos of the West Angola Conference believes the Agricultural Training Farm and further grow the region and that by training farmers in sustainable agricultural methods it can benefit rural and urban Angolans for generations to come.

Through the Conference offering, the churches of California – Nevada can play a vital role in this re-development.
