Seeds of a Sower

I write as September 11 approaches, a day of sacred remembrance for our nation. My spirit is troubled by the animosity being hurled at the Muslim community, threatening their places of worship and their sacred scriptures. My appreciation for the freedom of religion which I have enjoyed throughout my life is deepening. My chosen place of worship has been a safe haven not only for worship, but also as a community center for the public to gather for edification and relationships. I have never experienced the desecration of the holy scriptures of my tradition which deeply nourish my faith life. Even those who do not claim the faith of Judaism or Christianity have respectfully recognized the texts as great literature and a profound witness of our ancestors.

In this spirit, I share part of a Call to Respect for America's Tradition of Religious Liberty made by Interfaith Leaders representing various religious traditions:

As Jews, Christians, and Muslims, we are grateful to live in this democracy whose Constitution guarantees religious liberty for all. Our freedom to worship in congregations of our own choosing, to give witness to our moral convictions in the public square, and to maintain institutions that carry out our respective missions—all of these are bedrock American freedoms that must be vigorously guarded and defended lest they be placed at peril. The United States of America has been a beacon to the world in defending the rights of religious minorities, yet it is also sadly true that at times in our history particular groups have been singled out for unjust discrimination and have been made the object of scorn and animosity by those who have either misconstrued or intentionally distorted the vision of our founders....

We work together on the basis of deeply held and widely shared values, each supported by the sacred texts of our respective traditions. We acknowledge with gratitude the dialogues between our scholars and religious authorities that have helped us to identify a common understanding of the divine command to love one's neighbor. Judaism, Christianity and Islam all see an intimate link between faithfulness to God and love of neighbor; a neighbor who in many instances is the stranger in our midst. We are united in our conviction that by witnessing together in celebration of human dignity and religious freedom; by working together for interfaith understanding across communities and generations; and by cooperating with each other in works of justice and mercy for

the benefit of society, all of us will demonstrate our faithfulness to our deepest spiritual commitments. www.nccusa.org

As we seek to deepen our faithfulness, may we be respectful of other traditions. Unfortunately there are extremists who corrupt the essence of every faith tradition. It is important for us to seek accurate information from credible sources. In our global world it is increasingly important that take part in fanning the flames of peace and mutual respect.


Stewardship Opportunity


CROP Hunger Walk Sunday, October 3, 2010


WINTER NIGHTS

LUMC LIBRARY

As I was shelving books in the Friends Corner Book Shop (at the Lafayette Library) I found **FINDING DARWIN'S GOD** and took it home to read. I wanted to see what another person thought about evolution and God's creation as being part of the same.

Kenneth Miller, the author, offers a surprising resolution to the evolutionism vs. creationism debate. A distinguished professor of biology at Brown University, Miller argues that the genuine world of science is far more interesting than either the scientific mainstream or its creationist critics have assumed. He offers a thoughtful, cutting-edge analysis of the key issues that seem to divide science and religion. He feels that "properly understood, evolution adds depth and meaning not only to a strictly scientific view of the world, but also to a spiritual one." Miller's resolution of the issues that seem to divide God from evolution will serve as a guide to anyone interested in the classic questions of ultimate meaning and human origins.

That same day I found **CHARLES AND EMMA, THE DARWINS' LEAP OF FAITH** by Deborah Heiligman. Even though it was classified as "juvenile literature" I took it home, too.

This biography of Charles Darwin takes a personal look at the man who wife's religious convictions made him rethink how the world would receive his ideas.
